For now, let's each continue to do our part to keep each other safe and healthy, being respectful of one another and following Public Health Orders.


Thank goodness we have our hobbies to keep us busy! And ZOOM......

You can now Watch a Video Tour of the Quilt Canada virtual conference site here, if you would like to see what this is all about and how to navigate the conference site.

An Entry Pass must be purchased in order for the rest of the form to open and allow you to register for the presentations. Each attendee must register with a separate form. The entry pass is simply \$10.00 + tax.

This project uses a few materials from your stash which you will gather and cut out in advance. You'll be delighted as the project comes together and you find you have a useful little item for your studio table or to bring to a retreat.

REQUIRED MATERIALS:

Feature Fabric - (2) 6.5" x 6.5" squares Coordinating Fabric -

(1) 5.5" x 6.5" rectangle Coordinating Fabric -



(1) 6.5" x 17.5" rectangle

Please cut out fabric in advance and have your machine set up with a coordinating thread with bobbin wound.

You will also need; A small ruler such as (2.5" x 12")

A pencil or pen

Small fabric scissors

A few pins

Hot iron

Straight stitch foot

Free motion foot (optional)

Bonus lesson materials: 12" x 20" fabric that you absolutely love

20" coordinating ribbon (5/8" to 1/2")



THE LAST INSTALLMENT IS HERE!
THERE ARE TWO BLOCKS TO WORK ON: JACK IN THE BOX and ROSEBUD

Jack in the Box for the Prince George Quilters Guild



For a 12 1/2 inch Jack in the Box (12 inches when sewn in a quilt) you need the following cuts.


For the flying geese units you need: Four 5 1/2 inch by 3 inch rectangles of the B&W print. Eight 3 inch squares of the white-on-white.

For the Diagonal Half Squares (or HST) you need:
Four 3 3/8 inch squares of the white-on-white.
Two 3 3/8 inch squares of the red and two 3 3/8 inch squares of the black.


For the center strips you need four 5 1/2 by 2 1/2 inch strips of the red and one 2 1/2 inch square of black.

Make four flying geese units.


Place a 3 inch w-o-w square on the top of the 5 1/2 by 3 inch rectangle as shown. Sew diagonally from corner to corner. Trim leaving a 1/4 inch seam allowance. Press to the square.



Now repeat on the other side of each rectangle using the other 3 inch w-o-w square.




Next come the diagonal half squares (DHS) or half square triangles, which ever you prefer calling them. You can use which ever technique you want to make them, but this is my favorite.



First, mark your lightest squares diagonally through the center. (This will be a cutting line when you are finished.) Place your red 3 3/8 inch square, right sides together with the 3 3/8 inch background square. Sew on either side of the drawn line, exactly 1/4 inch from the first line. Cut this square in half on the cutting line. You will now have two diagonal half squares, which should measure exactly 3 inches. Repeat with the remaining 3 3/8 inch squares.

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Make four units like this




and then four like this.



Now sew a red strip between two of the units you just made. Notice how those units are turned, putting the red DHS in the center next to the red strip. Make two units like this.

This unit will be turned around when you put the block together.




Sew together this middle row.




Assemble following the diagram.

Your Jack in the Box block should measure 12 1/2 inches.



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Rosebud for the Prince George Quilters Guild



For a 12 1/2 inch Rosebud block you need: Four 2 1/4 inch squares and four 2 5/8 inch squares of the red

> Eight 2 1/4 inch squares, four 2 5/8 inch squares and one 2 inch square of the print Eight 2 5/8 inch squares of the white on-white Eight 2 1/4 inch squares of the black

For the center strips you need four 5 3/4 by 2 inch strips of the white-on-white

First we will make the diagonal half squares (DHS) or half square triangles, which ever you prefer calling them. You can use which ever technique you want to make them, but this is my favorite.



First, mark your white-on-white squares diagonally through the center. (This will be a cutting line when you are finished.) Place a red 2 5/8 inch square, right sides together with one of the 2 5/8 inch marked white-on-white square. Sew on either side of the drawn line, exactly 1/4 inch from the first line. Cut this square in half on the cutting line. Press them all to the darkest fabric, in this case red. You will now have two diagonal half-squares, which should measure exactly 2 1/4 inches. Repeat with the remaining 2 5/8 inch squares. Press all DHSs to the darker fabric, away from the white-on-white.

Make four units like this


and four like this.




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


Sew those together into four units which look like this. These should be 5 3/4 inches square when they are finished.






Sew a white-on-white strip between two of the units you just made. Notice how those units are turned. Make two units like this.





Sew together the middle row

Assemble following the diagram. Your Rosebud block should measure 12 1/2 inches.

FINISHING YOUR MYSTERY QUILT



FINISHING YOUR MYSTERY QUILT PART TWO

It's not a Quilt Until its Quilted!

The word *quilt* comes from the Latin *culcita* meaning a stuffed sack, but it came into the English language from the French word *cuilte*.

- You can quilt your MYSTERY QUILT in any way you like..... by hand or machine. It does not have to be done on a long arm.
- It just needs to have three layers: Top, Batting, and Backing, and those three layers need to be stitched together.
- It Needs to have finished edges..... Binding or Self Facing that is stitched down by Hand or Machine

FINALLY Attach a label.

"There's no wrong way to label a quilt."

FOR THE MYSTERY QUILT REVEAL, PLEASE INCLUDE

Four of the five items can be included on your quilt label, the fifth is optional, and probably the most sentimental.

- 1. Full name of the recipient, so there's no mistake to whom it belongs...
- 2. The full name of the maker of the quilt, not just 'mom' or 'grandma' or 'nana'.
- 3. What is the occasion for making the quilt. Christmas, wedding, graduation, etc.

In this case: PGQG Mystery Quilt 2021 Delaware Quilts

4. The year the quilt was finished (which isn't always the same year as when the quilt was started as we all know).



5. The most heartwarming of items to include on the label are 'love notes'. Sometimes, for very special occasions, try to write a little something for the recipient. Writing a love note largely depends on who it's for and why the quilt was made.

How We Started

In 2006 a local Edmonton quilter presented quilts to three Canadian Armed Forces members who were recovering in hospital from injuries they received in Afghanistan. It was her way of saying "Thank You" and giving some comfort to these military members. She was not prepared for the impact of meeting these brave young men and learning first hand of their injuries. It made such an impression that it has taken quilter Lezley Zwaal in directions she never imagined. From these humble beginnings Quilts of Valour - Canada was born.

Mission Statement

Our mission is to ensure that injured Canadian Forces members are recognized for their service and commitment to our country. We give this support through the presentation of quilts to comfort our injured past and present Canadian Forces members.

Quilts of Valour - Canada Society Launched

Through the encouragement, support and enthusiasm of quilters, the Quilts of Valour - Canada Society was formed as a registered national charity in 2009.

The Quilts of Valour – Canada Society has presented quilts to thousands of recipients who are coping with injuries both visible and invisible. These quilts are made by volunteer quilters from across the country who wished to show their appreciation to our injured Canadian Armed Forces members, past and present for their bravery and commitment to Canada and its citizens. The quilts come from individuals, groups and guilds, men and women, young people, retired armed forces members themselves and many others with no connection to the military.

- The Art Quilts will be displayed at Kathy's Quilts throughout August, 2021.




This was submitted by Diane Sales: It's definitely something we can all relate to, and Food for Thought!

Barbara Black a Quilter's Last Will and Testament writes, "Every day we get older. And no one gets to live forever. I don't want this to sound maudlin or creepy, but if I was gone tomorrow, my family has a BIG job ahead of them, dealing with all my quilt stuff." Learn how Barbara has prepared by creating a Quilter's Last Will and Testament.

For some time now, I have planned to help my family prepare for the day this all becomes theirs by creating a <u>Quilter's Last Will and Testament</u>. Here are 10 Top Tips on what I think your family needs to know about your stuff:

1. Who to call? Which quilter friends are willing to help your family sort through and arrange to sell or give away all this stuff.? Name at least 3 good friends, provide





2. Sewing Machines: how many do you have, where are they, serial numbers, when did you buy them and for how much? I currently have two Singer Featherweights, a Bernina 765 in an expensive cabinet and my beloved Bernina Q20 sit-down longarm. When I bought that in 2015, I told my husband it was really "expensive". Note I was not asking his permission to buy it, my money as a professional quiltmaker and teacher did that. But he only understood what that word meant when

he saw the credit card bill. Your family has no idea how much your very valuable machines cost or are worth today. The Featherweights are often thought to be "toy machines". One of mine I had painted so I have almost \$700 invested in that baby--I want that to go to granddaughter Stella someday.

3. Your Important Quilts: Which mean the most to you and are the ones you really want to stay with your family? Do you have some that have won major awards or been published that will increase their value? These "Best Quilts" need to be documented in writing, with photos, to help ensure that information stays with those quilts. Make a LIST--who do you want to get your favorite quilts? There are a few I want to go to my grandchildren, Stella and Sam, when they are old enough to appreciate them. Yes, I have given them baby quilts and kid quilts already. I mean the ones I want them to share with their children, long after I'm gone, when they talk about their "BB".

4. Your Quilts You Would Like to Give to Someone: make a list of any quilts you want given to a specific friend or family member. The "quilt worthy" person who will be so happy to have a piece of you in their life. If you are lucky enough to know when your end is near, add their name to those quilts



in advance. Or, BETTER YET--give that special friend that special quilt while you are able to see them receive it.

<u>5. Your Quilts that can be Sold or Given Away:</u> is there an organization you want to support? Project Linus, Quilts of Valor, Guild Comfy/Charity Quilts all come to mind. But there are organizations that conduct fundraisers which might appreciate a quilt or two. Educational organizations and those that support children in need are possible candidates. I easily have 50 small wall quilts laying around that have little value for sale but could raise a little money for charity.

<u>6. Put Labels on ALL your quilts.</u> If you don't automatically put labels on ALL your quilts, start doing that today. Here is a Tutorial I wrote about Labels 4 years ago: <u>Quilt Labels</u>

7. Important Quilts Still Under Construction—again, if you know your time is short, find those good friends and ask them if they would be willing to finish that really important quilt you are working on, as a gift for your family. Not every quilt you ever started—just that special one you ran out of time to finish. Someone will say "yes".

8. Be aware that most of our stuff has little value to others, even quilters. The books, patterns you plan to make "someday", magazine articles you saved for 30 years, the 200 pens/markers in a box. even all your rulers, cutters and mats. People will be happy to take some of it off your hands, but not for money. Now is the best time to start purging that stuff. Have a "swap" or "giveaway" for close quilting friends. This takes work but you bought it all so you really ought to help your family by dealing with some of this stuff now, before it becomes their problem. The only special "things" I want saved for my family are my thimbles. Some are sterling silver, some are inexpensive brass topped thimbles I first learned to hand-quilt with. They are my most meaningful "tools" and take up very little room. I am

looking for a special box I can store them in--I will include the story of those thimbles in the box.

<u>9. The Fabric</u>: It has value, to a lot of quilters. But, again, it's a matter of quantity. I am really in the purge mode this year as I try to reduce some of the "sinful" amount I have. There is a sale/swap/giveaway in my future this year. Just as soon as I sort through those closets again. Do you LOVE all the

fabric you currently own?

10. Antique Quilts and Tops: I almost forgot this category--I have about a dozen antique quilts and tops, some cost me a good bit of money. some I lucked into for very little. They are stored away from my quilts, in a closet. I must take time to

create a LIST of these, what I know about them, what I paid and where I bought them. Sure don't want my kids to think these are just junky old rags...

11. Lastly, write a note to the future about what quilting has meant to you. It has been my most important passion for more than 35 years, more dear to me than anything other than my family. It has gotten me through tough times, brought more joy than I could have imagined, and added dear friends to my life that mean so much--you know who you are. Over the years I have saved a lot of notes I have received from friends and students--they are in a beautiful basket for my kids to find someday. That is a good place for my "letter to the future" to reside.

These quilts all have to go somewhere. My kids appreciate them but they don't want them all:

So, what have I left out? Can you think of more steps we should take to deal with all our stuff? Any of these things can be done now, in bits of time. It doesn't have to take a month of hard work. Just get started. Take one of these ideas a month and do just that. In less than a year you'll be done. Your family will thank you.

And, let's quilt.


